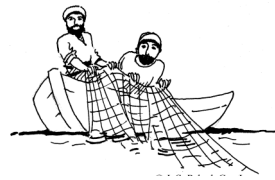


GOSPEL SUMMARY: MARK 1:14-20



Today's gospel reading recounts how Jesus calls his first disciples Simon and Andrew, James and John. His herald, John the Baptist, has been put in prison. Jesus urgently calls people to repent and believe in the good news. Like the Ninevites in the first reading, the four fishermen immediately respond to God's call. They leave their boats and their nets in order to follow Jesus right on the spot. "I will make you fishers of men," Jesus promises his new disciples. They take his words to heart and make following him their first priority in life.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR GOSPEL: What does Jesus call his first disciples and us to do? Are there things that might prevent us from hearing Jesus' urgent call? What are they? Who or what can help us to put following Jesus first in our lives? What do you think Jesus means by the term "fishers of men"? Who do you know in your family, school, parish, or community that seems to be a fisher of men, women, or children? Explain what this person does and tell how you might try to follow this person's example.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: When have you experienced the Kingdom of God?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION: As a result of the reforms of the Second Vatican Council, the Church has defined a new pastoral plan for your care whenever you struggle with illness. There are rites for children, a communal rite for celebration in the parish, forms of care for the sick at each stage and transition, and for the desperately ill. There is a much broader interpretation of who may be anointed, including not only the visibly ill, but those battling addiction, or the elderly coping with the frustrating aches and pains of aging. Children under seven are normally not anointed, since the oil is associated with reconciliation. (For the same reason, they do not receive ashes on Ash Wednesday.) However, children close to that age who have a serious illness often gain a deep level of spiritual insight and maturity, and may benefit from catechesis for the Eucharist. Once admitted to confirmation and/or Eucharist, a sick child should be anointed. It is a great strength of our present rite that a section is included with prayers tailored to the experience and understanding of a child. Considering our recent history of being fairly sparing with this sacrament, the generosity of celebration today is helping us to retrieve an essential part of our tradition of reverence for the sick.

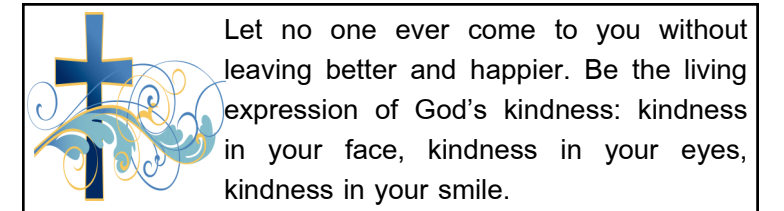

Pope Francis: Maturing in faith means not just asking God for favors.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- The journey of faith always begins a little selfishly, seeking from God healing or help with a problem, but Christian maturity is allowing oneself to be purified and to arrive at the point of recognizing Jesus as savior, Pope Francis said. Celebrating Mass Jan. 22 in the chapel of the Domus Sanctae Marthae where he lives, Pope Francis commented on Gospel stories that recount how the crowds flocked to Jesus hoping for healing. "We can never follow God with a purity of intentions from the beginning," the pope said. "It's always a little for ourselves and a little because of God. To journey is to purify these intentions. "Pope Francis, according to Vatican Radio, told the small congregation that the crowds originally followed Jesus because they were "a bit bored" by the way the Jewish elders of their day were teaching the faith and they felt oppressed by "the many commandments and precepts that were laid on their shoulders, but never reached their hearts. "But when they saw and heard Jesus, "they felt something move inside them," he said. "It was the Holy Spirit who awakened this and they went out to find Jesus. "The way Jesus spoke and the physical healings he performed, the pope said, were simply signs of "another healing," the definitive healing that led the people to a deeper relationship with God and to recognition that Jesus is the savior. "He is the savior and we are saved by him. This is the most important thing," the pope said. "This is the strength of our faith." "When we, for one reason or another, are

feeling down, we should remember that Jesus prays for us and intercedes for us continually," Pope Francis said. "So often we forget this."
